From the Parish Priest's Desk

Last week in the light of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, we considered that the disciple must always be available and open to God's will. Once we have acknowledged him as Lord, we are naturally at his disposal. Discipleship is a journey and the nature of the journey is grow deeper and deeper in union with Jesus.

This journey is an interior one that takes place in the depth of the soul. What is the gateway or entrance? Jesus says to "enter by the narrow gatebecause narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it." (Mt 7:13-14) The Fathers of the Church see the narrow gate as being prayer and meditation. St Teresa of Avila tells us that if anyone points out a different way then they are misleading us. Prayer is where the love of God transforms us to be true followers of Christ. This is why Jesus himself spent long nights in prayer alone and often on a mountain.

So let us make prayer a priority. How often and for how long will differ from person to person – we don't expect a worker to pray as much as a monk. But everyone must make time for it. Likewise how we pray or what we say will differ from person to person and will also change depending on our own development. But whatever we are praying whether the rosary, scriptures, or just sitting quietly in God's presence, the most important thing is that we are aware of whom we are talking to and that how our prayer flows depends upon him.

Sometimes prayer seems to flow smoothly and beautifully and we receive great consolations from it. At other times, it seems so dry and so difficult that we wonder if we should bother at all. This is a crucial crossroads in our journey: we must persevere in prayer regardless of how we think we are doing and no matter how dry it may be. This is the main reason people do not progress far on their journey because they stop or slow down when prayer seems to be difficult. But what in fact is happening is that God is purifying us through difficulties in prayer because he wants us to learn to pray for his sake alone and not for what we get out of it. St Therese of Lisieux compared it to a bird who is walking around on the ground whilst it is raining and the clouds are covering the sun. The little bird must know that the sun is still shining even though it cannot see it. Prayer has to be a journey by faith and trust and not by sight and consolations.

Another important thing to remember is that distractions are not only normal but they are a good thing. Most of the time in prayer we will have distractions and this is completely normal. Indeed St Teresa says that one cannot pray without distractions. What does she mean? Every time we turn from a distraction to God, we are praying and growing in love. Every time this happens we are undergoing a vconversion. Indeed St Teresa says that one cannot pray without distractions. What does she mean? Every time we turn from a distraction to God, we are praying and growing in love. Every time this happens we are undergoing a conversion. This is what ongoing conversion and repentance means: a constant turning away from our thoughts, desires, attractions back to God.

Lastly, in prayer we need to learn to listen, to seek that still quiet voice that is speaking in the depths of our soul. Growth in the spiritual life is through the transforming word that God speaks in the soul. This is why silence is so important. Not just exterior but also interior. Quietening our thoughts and distractions by praying a verse of scripture or the Our Father slowly thereby recollecting ourselves and creating stillness in the depths which enables us to listen.

To summarise:

- Prayer is the great necessity: it is the narrow gate, it is sitting at the feet of Jesus like Mary doing the one necessary thing.
- Faithfulness to prayer is the only way to grow spiritually.
- Dryness and difficulties in prayer such as distractions or thoughts enable us to pray better.
- Learn to listen and to seek silence and solitude. God bless, Fr. Dominic *Fiat!*
