The rite for the dedication of a church and an altar is rightly considered among the most solemn liturgical services. A church is the place where the Christian community is gathered to hear the word of God, to offer intercession and praise to him, and above all to celebrate the holy mysteries, and it is the place where the holy sacrament of the eucharist is kept. Thus it stands as a special kind of image of the Church itself, which is God's temple built from living stones. And the altar of a church, around which the holy people of God gather to take part in the Lord's sacrifice and to be refreshed at the heavenly meal, stands as a sign of Christ himself, who is the priest, the victim, and the altar of his own sacrifice.

## From the Parish Priest's Desk ....

#### Dear Faithful,

There are many problems facing the world today and great tensions between the nations. Laws contrary to God's commandments are enforced with great detriment to the sanctity of life both at its beginning and its end. Many realise this and want to work for a more peaceful world and a more holistic relationship with nature. But they are not looking in the right places. To paraphrase E. M. Schumacher - People go on crying out for solutions but they are looking in the wrong places and they are angry when they are told that the restoration must come from within the person not from without.

In the papers there are terrible incidents of evil that happen daily whilst at the same time, the papers praise a free and godless lifestyle. The two are connected! If the world is going to be saved and avoid a catastrophe, people need to start by changing their hearts and that starts with us – ME. St Catherine of Sienna realised this profoundly. She retreated (literally) into her room at home and spent large amounts of time, knowing that the only way she could be transformed was by opening herself up to the love of God. When she eventually left her room, she became the greatest and most influential peace maker of her time. Any impact on the world to bring about peace and happiness depends, therefore, on souls who wish to undergo this transformation.

The above thoughts are indebted to David Torkington's introductory chapter on "How to Pray" which is also available on youtube.

One thing we should be aware of is that opening ourselves to God's love will transform us but it will also reveal to us our sinfulness. We must be prepared to endure this and work at our faults in order to be more fully open to the love of God.

The Liturgy this weekend calls us to repentance both internally by a change of heart but also externally by changing the way we treat others and being prepared to give of our plenty to those who lack. One of the most powerful ways of helping others is to offer reparation for the salvation of their souls.

So let us follow St Paul's exhortation in the second reading to "fight the good fight of the faith and win for yourself the eternal life to which you were called."

Here are five habits St. Padre Pio believed all Catholics should practice, based on advice he gave to his spiritual children.

I. Weekly Confession;"Confession is the soul's bath. You must go at least once a week. I do not want souls to stay away from confession more than a week. Even a clean and unoccupied room gathers dust; return after a week and you will see that it needs dusting again!"

II . Daily Communion:"It is quite true, we are not worthy of such a gift. However, to approach the Blessed Sacrament in a state of mortal sin is one thing, and to be unworthy is quite another. All of us are unworthy, but it is He who invites us. It is He who desires it. Let us humble ourselves and receive Him with a heart contrite and full of love."

III. Examination of Conscience Every Evening:Someone once told Padre Pio that he thought a nightly examination of conscience was pointless because he knew what was sin as it was committed. To this, Padre Pio replied, "That is true enough. But every experienced merchant in this world not only keeps track throughout the day of whether he has lost or gained on each sale. In the evening, he does the bookkeeping for the day to determine what he should do on the morrow. It follows that it is indispensable to make a rigorous examination of conscience, brief but lucid, every night."

IV. Daily Spiritual Reading: "The harm that comes to souls from the lack of reading holy books makes me shudder.... What power spiritual reading has to lead to a change of course, and to make even worldly people enter into the way of perfection."

V. Mental Prayer Twice Daily: "If you do not succeed in meditating well, do not give up doing your duty. If the distractions are numerous, do not be discouraged; do the meditation of patience, and you will still profit. Decide upon the length of your meditation, and do not leave your place before finishing, even if you have to be crucified. Why do you worry so much because you do not know how to meditate as you would like? Meditation is a means to attaining God, but it is not a goal in itself. Meditation aims at the love of God and neighbour. Love God with all your soul without reserve, and love your neighbour as yourself, and you will have accomplished half of your meditation."
