Spiritual Thought for the Week...

"Every one of us, therefore, especially in this Season which prepares us for Christmas, can ask himself: What am I waiting for? What, at this moment of my life, does my heart long for? And this same guestion can be posed at the level of the family, of the community, of the nation. What are we waiting for together? What unites our aspirations, what brings them together? In the time before Jesus' birth the expectation of the Messiah was very strong in Israel - that is, the expectation of an Anointed one, a descendent of King David, who would at last set the people free from every form of moral and political slavery and find the Kingdom of God. But no one would ever have imagined that the Messiah could be born of a humble girl like Mary, the betrothed of a righteous man, Joseph. Nor would she have ever thought of it, and yet in her heart the expectation of the Saviour was so great, her faith and hope were so ardent, that he was able to find in her a worthy mother. Moreover, God himself had prepared her before time. There is a mysterious correspondence between the waiting of God and that of Mary, the creature "full of grace", totally transparent to the loving plan of the Most High. Let us learn from her, the Woman of Advent, how to live our daily actions with a new spirit, with the feeling of profound expectation that only the coming of God can fulfil."

From the Parish Priest's Desk

Dear Faithful,

This beautiful season of Advent which ushers in the new Liturgical Year brings us once more to this time of preparation. What are we preparing for? The liturgy this Sunday reminds us that there are three comings of Jesus?

- The Coming of Christ at Christmas
- The Coming of Christ at the end of time.
- And between the two......the Coming of Christ to the individual soul.

We need to be looking forward to and yearning for these. Pope Emeritus Benedict - in our Spiritual Thought this bulletin – puts before us the question: "What am I waiting for? What is my heart longing for? This is a good meditation to do: to ask ourselves these questions and to ask for the grace of a continuing conversion of our heart so that our greatest longing is Christ.

The Liturgy lays before us the urgent advice:

STAY AWAKE - WATCH - PERSEVERE TO THE END.

How do we accomplish this? How do we make sure that when Jesus comes for us – either at our death or if we are present at the final events of the world – that we are ready; ready to go into the wedding feast. A great scripture commentator answers it in this way:

"Perseverance to the end, rooted in fidelity to Christ, means constantly keeping alive the memory of the words and person of the Lord Jesus, of everything he has taught me, everything that he has done for me, everything his presence has meant in my life. It means abiding in the conviction that I cannot have my deepest identity apart from him and his action in my life. It means not compromising the truths I have come to know since putting on the mind of Christ and beginning to see the world and all reality through his eyes. It means actively choosing, against all the odds, not to stop living the life of grace given to me at baptism......it means not valuing mere physical and psychological comfort or survival or reputation or property – all of which are ephemeral realities – above the truth that the image of God lives in each man."



- 1) Although not as demanding as Lent, Advent is still a penitential season: prayer, fasting and almsgiving really help our spiritual progress. I particular encourage fasting a little especially from media.
- 2) Make a good confession. More on this next week.
- **3**) Read some Scripture: the prophet Isaiah is a good Old Testament book to read.
- 4) Deepen our prayer life.
- 5) Have an Advent Wreath at home.

Wishing you a very fruitful Advent season.
