NOVEMBER DEVOTIONS

Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. As a reminder of our duty to pray for the suffering faithful in Purgatory, the Church has dedicated the month of November to the Holy Souls. The Holy Souls are those who have died in the state of grace but who are not yet free from all punishment due to their unforgiven venial sins and all other sins already forgiven for which satisfaction is still to be made. They are certain of entering Heaven, but first they must suffer in Purgatory. The Holy Souls cannot help themselves because for them the night has come, when no man can work (John 9:4). It is our great privilege of brotherhood that we can shorten their time of separation from God by our prayers, good works and especially the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Praying for the dead, especially for those we have known, is a requirement of Christian charity. Our own prayers and sacrifices can be offered up to relieve their suffering. Some or all of the following prayers can be incorporated into our daily prayers during this month.

Some Prayers

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen. - One of the most commonly recited of Catholic prayers in times past, this prayer has fallen into disuse in the last few decades. Prayer for the dead, however, is one of the greatest acts of charity we can perform, to help them during their time in Purgatory, so that they can enter more quickly into the fullness of heaven.

For the souls in Purgatory: My Jesus, by the sorrows Thou didst suffer in Thine agony in the Garden, in Thy scourging and crowning with thorns, in the way to Calvary, in Thy crucifixion and death, have mercy on the souls in purgatory, and especially on those that are most forsaken; do Thou deliver them from the dire torments they endure; call them and admit them to Thy most sweet embrace in paradise. Our Father, Hail Mary, Eternal rest etc. (Taken from Catholic Culture Website)

Indulgences.

1st November to 8th November Plenary indulgence for Holy Souls by visiting cemetery and there praying for the dead and fulfilling normal conditions. (Normal Conditions = Holy Communion that day, Prayers for Pope that day and confession ten days before or after.)

From the Parish Priest's Desk....

Dear Faithful,

The theme of the Liturgy today is the Resurrection. Saint Paul tells us that without the Resurrection of Jesus, our faith would be in vain. On one level it is quite simple: Jesus who had been dead for three days rose from the dead; not simply to the life that he had had before but his Sacred Humanity existed now in a new and eternal mode of being. However, the significance of what happened is very profound.

Jesus was born in complete humility and poverty and all through his life, many did not recognise him. They passed him by. Even after his glorious resurrection, we see that many did not/could not see him. Only those who had the seed planted in them would recognise him and adore him.

Jesus' humanity received so much glory because of his perfect obedience that allowed the debt owed by humanity to be repaid. As Adam sinned through disobedience and forfeited life, so through one man's obedience all were reborn to new life.

Thus, "resurrection" is not simply about when our bodies are restored to us but about a daily dying to the old man and rising to the new. Thus, this theme is deeply embedded in everything. Each day the sun sets and rises. We have the dying of winter and the new life of spring. Even within our own lives we witness good times and more difficult ones. If we are to rise on the last day to eternal life, we must during this earthly existence continuously die to our vices and rise to virtues. The key which enables this to take place is obedience. It is through our obedience to God and to those who may have authority over us that this resurrection takes place. Disobedience on the other hand only produces more problems and darkness.

The reason there is so much darkness in the world today is that man has forsaken God and become disobedient to his commands. Man has glorified his own will and sought only what he wishes with the consequences we see all around us. However, we by our obedience to God can help restore what has been lost.

Jesus teaches us that resurrection can only be reached by first passing through suffering. Suffering brings about three types of resurrection: Firstly, suffering enables us – when embraced – to rise to grace. Secondly, it enables us to grow in virtues as we practice resignation, obedience, patience etc. Lastly, as we grow in the spiritual life, suffering becomes a crown .

In summary, through obedience to the will of God and in union with Jesus' obedience, all things can be accomplished in us. It is the only way to holiness. It is how Jesus himself redeemed us by fulfilling perfectly the will of the Father.

How to bring this about? It is daunting because our own will is so strong it fights tooth and nail to get its way. Even the great Saint Paul said that the things he didn't want to do, he did' and the things he wished to do, he didn't. You feel in this passage (Romans 7:15-20) the cry of every soul involved in this battle to the death. But Paul also tells us that the answer to the battle is Jesus.

One very simple but powerful way of beginning is look at everything we do in a different light. If we are washing the dishes, we say that Jesus wants us to wash the dishes so let us do them together. Jesus wants to eat, Jesus wants to walk, Jesus wants to pray, so I will do these things with him. The only thing we can't say this about of course is sin. It is a simple approach to life and it is very powerful in conquering our human will. (Remember that when we say our human will we are using it to stand for our own particular desires apart from God's – we shall always have our human will in the sense that it is our faculty that enables us to choose and thus to love.)

It is a difficult journey and we will often get it wrong but the rewards are so great that it is worth being fully committed to always doing the Will of God to the best of our abilities.

Let us continue our prayers this month for the Holy Souls who are so dependant on our intercession.
