From the Parish Priest's Desk

Dear Faithful,

One of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit that we need to rediscover is "the Fear of the Lord.

(Wonder and Awe): With the gift of fear of the Lord we are aware of the glory and majesty of God. A person with wonder and awe knows that God is the perfection of all we desire: perfect knowledge, perfect goodness, perfect power, and perfect love. This gift is described by Aquinas as a fear of separating oneself from God. He describes the gift as a "filial fear," like a child's fear of offending his father, rather than a "servile fear," that is, a fear of punishment. Also known as knowing God is all powerful. Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom (Prov 1:7) because it puts our mindset in its correct location with respect to God: we are the finite, dependent creatures, and He is the infinite, all-powerful Creator. (Univ.of Arizona 7 gifts)

The Lord created the world out of nothing and he created us. He is all powerful, all knowing, all good, all merciful. He created us out of the overflowing abundance of his love. We were thus created to know, love and serve God and our happiness is totally dependant upon these three commands. Once we realise – not just in our intellect but throughout our whole being – the greatness of God we start to rediscover a proper perspective on things. We start to look at things as God sees them (the Gift of Wisdom) rather than always seeing everything from our perspective. Through meditation and prayer we begin to develop an awe and wonder concerning God and upon realising his greatness and goodness and merciful love, we desire above all things never to offend him.

Jesus in today's gospel shows us that he comes to bring to perfection the law. He also tells us quite clearly that every aspect of the law matters – no matter how seemingly small and unimportant. If this applied to the Mosaic Law, how much more then does it apply to the New Law and the teaching contained in the Sermon of the Mount. To break a law knowingly and with full consent (even the smallest venial sin) is a great evil than all the natural disasters in the world.

Jesus makes this clear in graphic terms: better to be blind or maimed than to go to hell. There seems today to be an assumed feeling that everyone is going to go to heaven regardless of our behaviour and that it is up to the individual to choose which things he will follow and which things he will not. This has become so prevalent as to endanger the Church itself (cf Our Lady's apparition at Akita). The result of which is that we are in danger of dividing up the law of God. Those laws that seem outdated or irrelevant or go against human love can be consigned to the past. NO! We need to regain a proper perspective on things. We obey the laws of God and the laws of the Church (which are also laws of God) first and foremost because they are of God and therefore, supremely good and completely and totally orientated to our good. They are the expression of his love for us and they are safety nets to stop us from losing eternal life. Nearly all of us – because the power and influence of the world is so great – need to do a serious work in regaining our perspective on things. St Francis de Sales in his Introduction to the Devout Life tells us to examine:

- What is the attitude of your heart towards mortal sin? Have you a firm purpose never to commit it no matter what might happen. This resolution is the foundation of the spiritual life.
- What is the attitude of your heart towards the commandments of God? Do you find them good, sweet, agreeable?

We can also ponder these immutable laws of God:

- How many Catholics routinely miss Sunday mass without any real concern or knowledge that this is a grave sin? Moreover, they consider mass online a valid substitution.
- How many Catholics practice birth control which is intrinsically evil?
- How many Catholics put the kingdom of God first above all other things?
- How many Catholics still believe that the only place for sex is within a marriage between a man and a woman?
- How many having committed these sins fail to go to confession before receiving Holy Communion?

Saint Benedict tells us to always remember the merciful love of God and now is the time of mercy. But once we have asked for God's mercy and obtained his forgiveness and love, His Mercy requires a change on our part and to resolve with all our might and strength to follow his law carefully. Obedience and Humility. Humility and Obedience. Prayer. Prayer.
