From the Parish Priest's Desk...Our Lenten Journey.

Dear Faithful

God teaches us through images about his nature, about the spiritual life and about the Church. One of the most central images is that of being a shepherd. Indeed one of the earliest images we have in the catacombs is that of Jesus, the Good Shepherd, carrying back the lost sheep on his shoulders. In the ancient world, the king was regarded as a shepherd who had been anointed by God; thus, as Pope Benedict pointed out Christ the Good Shepherd is Christ the King and this tells us about the nature of both his kingship and his kingdom. Two important Old Testament passages set the scene for Christ's use of this title. Firstly, Psalm 23 so well known: "The Lord is my shepherd there is nothing I shall want..... he leads me, he guides me, he protects me, and he is always with me no matter how dark the path."

Secondly, in the Prophet Ezekiel (Chp 34-37) God foretells that HE HIMSELF will go in search of his sheep and look after them: "And I will bring them out from the peoples, and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land.....I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. I will seek the lost and bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the crippled and I will strengthen the weak, and the fat and the strong I will watch over." (Ezekiel 34:13,15-16 – cf Jesus of Nazareth vol I) These Old Testament readings therefore prepare us for the discourse of Jesus in John 10 and also the many, many interrelated connections: Jesus as the Lamb of God etc. But let us ask ourselves are we really understanding what is going on. What is God actually saying?

1) It is so important for us to understand that Jesus comes to heal and bind us up. This is an aspect that needs constantly re-emphasising: WE NEED HEALING. When, we hear the word healing we primarily think of physical healing – after all we see so many instances of this in the gospels. Now this is important but the most important healing is inner healing – the healing of wounds either inflicted on us by ourselves or by others but which in both cases come down to sin. Jesus physically cures always to lead the person into deeper inner healing which then enables a true conversion to Christ. Cf The Blind Man in John 9, Mary Magdalene, John 5:14 "Now you have been made whole, go and sin no more lest a worse thing happen to you."

2) We first need to be healed if we are going to be truly able to follow Christ and experience the true freedom of the children of God. This freedom is an inner freedom. Everyone needs healing because everyone has wounds because everyone is a sinner. We need healing in our emotions, our mind, our soul as well as our bodies. Indeed we could say that many illnesses are a direct result of our inner wounds. (Look at the case of anger for example)

3) If we do not experience this inner healing then we never attain to the true person we are meant to be in the eyes of God – which he had of us before all ages and which we shall, God willing, attain to in heaven.

Let's look at a practical example. A soul is using the sacraments, praying but is constantly bound by the same things; pornography for example or anger. They receive forgiveness for their sins but they never experience true freedom from their sins. Can we imagine that this is truly what Christ envisions? Is this really the good news? What then stops us? Deep within us sin creates wounds because sin is choosing an idol instead of God. At a time of difficulty, hurt etc (I.e the cross) rather then turning towards God to be with us and comfort and heal us, we choose an escape route: it could be drink, food, lust = we choose an idol. We are very good at then burying deep in us this choice and it is this that stops us being free children of the lord.....until.....we address the issue, reject the idol and invite the Holy Spirit to transform us.

The Modern World makes this worse as it preaches that freedom is attained by and through idols – freedom means doing whatever we wish. It also places the cure for the situation solely in the physical and psychological areas (both of which have their role) whilst never addressing the true cause which is spiritual.

WE NEED PRAYER, THE SACRAMENTS.....AND HEALING.

Let us always remember the greatness, the beauty and the wholeness to which we are being called. It requires realising that only in seeking to become that which God envisions for us will lie our true happiness. This requires a discipline, a prayer life, sacrifice etc but it might also require that we work at our own healing. That those wounds of which we are ashamed or wounds that are buried so deep that we are no longer conscious of them come to the surface and are cured. So often God is powerless because we have deep within us idols that first need removing.

But let us always remember God is never ashamed of us, he comes to meet us in our very brokenness, our very sinfulness because he has the power to mould us in his own image and likeness. He is the Good Shepherd who never ties of seeking us and carrying us back on his shoulders. But let us also ask him to make us aware of those idols that we still have within us, so that they can be crushed and our wholeness restored.
