From the Parish Priest's Desk...Our Lenten Journey.

Dear Faithful

Jesus tells us in today's gospel: "I am the way, the truth and the life." Jesus here claims as Son of God that he IS truth, life and the way. We know this gospel passage well but we need to reflect upon this deeply. It means that Christ must be the centre of our life, the centre of everything: not simply our prayers but out thoughts, everything we think do and say. This is the call of the disciple and it is this which gives meaning to life and to everything we do.

The modern world is full of plans, methods etc – how to lose weight more effectively, how to run faster, how to become more productive. We judge our lives by what we have, what job we do etc. Now it is good to have plans, methods but if the object becomes simply building up my self-image or judging my worth or what I have achieved, then Christ is no longer at the centre and the results are that we feel more pressure, more haste and more frustration.

But when whatever we do has Christ at its centre then we begin to experience life in a different way. For example, we can exercise either because we choose it and simply to improve our health and sense of well-being or because a healthy body will serve Christ better and give him more glory.

It would be a very good and holy exercise to go through our lives and ask about what we are doing: Why are we really doing this? Is Christ at the centre? Another example is school and exams. One approach is that we are motivated simply by wanting a good qualifications so we can get a good job and we can feel secure. Or we can attend to what we are learning through every subject and what we learn about God.

Especially important is replacing haste, drivenness with rest. One of the ten commandments tells us quite clearly to keep holy the sabbath. That the sabbath must be a day of rest so we can listen to and spend time with God. The sabbath has disappeared in society – it is a day of shopping or sport or aimless activities. What is the result? People become less rested and more frustrated. We need to rest. This can be equally of the spiritual life. Even our pursuit of Christ can be driven and our image of God becomes that of a slot-machine God who provided we put in the right amount will give us what we ask for. We need to remember that all progress is down to grace, we need to learn to simply be at peace with God, resting in his company. This is difficult because often our mind is racing and we are burned out. Some learnt this during lock down but the lesson has been quickly forgotten.

I listened to an interesting podcast and one of the pieces of advice was never spend less than twenty minutes eating, sit down and chew everything slowly. This can help restore peace and tranquility.

It is difficult because often our jobs and employment necessitates haste and pressure. But if we try bit by bit to take everything that bit slower it is amazing how that reduces stress.

Why is any of this relevant? If we want to place Christ at the centre of our lives, it requires peace, time to reflect, time to listen. If we are never still, if we are always surrounded by noise, God cannot get a foot inside the door and we shall not be able to hear his voice.

We are living in the seventh millennium which corresponds to the seventh day of creation when God rested. In the era in which we are living, we must learn to rest; it is the great secret of the spiritual life and the journey to holiness. Our Lord himself invites us to put down our burdens, lay aside our work and allow him to refresh us. If we put Jesus at the centre and take up his sweet yoke, he promises that we shall find rest for our souls. After all is that not what we are all preparing for: Eternal Rest.
