From the Parish Priest's Desk...Our Lenten Journey.

Dear Faithful,

The parable of the workers in the vineyard is one of those passages which force us to ask of ourselves: how well do we understand God. The owner of the vineyard who represents God seems to be more concerned with teaching his employees about understanding the nature of God than about the welfare of the vineyard. He wishes to change and transform the way the workers look at things. He wants them to see the gratuitous goodness and overflowing generosity of God that sees all men as equal, who rejoices more of the sinner's conversion than the just.

Jesus representing the Father turns the whole world's way of looking at things upside down: we have to lose our life in order to save it; the last will be first; the blessings of God will be reserved for the poor, the mourners, the peacemakers etc.

One of the great dangers that the workers who were hired first fell into is to end up being angry with God because he doesn't think the way we think; because his ways are not our ways. There is a tendency in us all not to allow ourselves to be transformed into God's image but to transform God into what we think he should be. Hence, the scribes and pharisees would rather hate God than admit that they needed to be transformed.

I would suggest that the Liturgy this weekend is a good chance for us to take stock of how we see God?

How do we perceive God?

How do we think God looks at us?

Do we think of God as a hard task master?

Do we think of him as a loving Father who is desperate to give to us all that he has and is?

Do we think of God as kind and gentle?

What image we have of God is going to be important in our spiritual development; especially important is whether or not we see him as a loving Father and therefore, whether we trust him or not. Trust is at the centre here and is so important. We must be so enamoured with God that we become completely confident in entrusting everything to him.

Some popular misconceptions of God that can be found everywhere: "The Slot Machine God." Here we believe that if we put our money into the machine it is up to the machine to deliver the prize. Thus, if we say our prayers, keep the commandments then God owes us our reward. What this leads to is an impersonal relationship with God – it is purely one of transaction. This completely undermines relationship and the very nature of God. It also means that we shall become like the pharisees – simply intent on keeping the law.

Another but more tragic view of God is that he is not a loving Father and cannot be trusted. This often arises when people have suffered injuries in life, or have experienced a human father that badly let them down and thus, this has been transformed onto God the Father. I think most of us at some level experience a distrust of God and so keep him at a distance. This needs working at or rather healing because it will mean that we never grow up to be mature Christians confident in our identity as sons and daughters of God, heirs to his kingdom.

St Therese of Lisieux was interesting in that she placed all her eggs in one basket. She was going to totally trust God come what may, regardless of how she might act. She wouldn't allow anything to undermine this trust to such an extent that she said that even if she was the greatest sinner, she would have no fear because she would still trust God to save her.
