From the Parish Priest's Desk...Our Lenten Journey.

Dear Faithful,

We celebrate this weekend the feast of Christ the King. This feast was first instituted by Pius XI in 1925 to combat the problems facing the world. What are the most important things we can learn from this feast?

- All problems in the world come from a rejection of Christ as King; that he has a divine right to rule over all. Peace in the world will not be restored until this right is recognised. (by offering himself on the altar of the cross as a spotless sacrifice to bring us peace.)
- Jesus Christ has this right not only by his divine nature but also as man. He is a true king, descendant of David in the flesh.
- His kingship by uniting all things in creation, will present to the heavenly Father and eternal and universal kingdom. (*and making all created things* subject to his rule he might present to the immensity of your majesty and eternal and universal kingdom)
- This kingdom will bring about truth and life, holiness and grace, justice, love and peace.
- We pray for the coming of his kingdom on earth every time we pray the Our Father but this kingdom will only come when his will is finally done on earth as it is in heaven.
- We must obey Christ and his Church in all things; not only the ten commandments, the beatitudes, the new commandment of love but the commands too of the Church are his express wishes.
- Therefore, to reject Church teaching is to reject Christ and contrary to what one might think, it can never bring peace and joy.

How does this apply to us as individuals?

If we wish not only to be saints but also have a life that is peaceful, full of love and grace, full of beauty and truth, we must subject our wills to Jesus. This can be seen in three simple ways:

- Accepting as his loving will all that befalls us and accept as coming from his loving hands. Even evil done to us is permitted by him to accomplish our sanctification.
- Accept our duties of state as his will; that is, the particular things we have to do because of our position in life.
- In other areas to discern what Jesus wants of us.

One of the simplest but most effective ways of accomplishing this is to change our ways of looking at things. We no longer want to do actions, think thoughts etc because we choose them but because Jesus wants to do them in us. For example, if we wish to pray – we say Jesus wants to pray, let us pray with Jesus. This can apply to any action not only the difficult ones but also the ones that bring us pleasure. We forget Jesus also want us to enjoy life.

The simplest and best proof of this is to simply try it. Little by little,we find our lives changing profoundly.

Come Lord Jesus, Come to reign in our hearts and our minds. Establish your kingdom on earth. Make our wills subject to yours and thereby offering the Heavenly Father the glory that is his due.
