Consider how to vote at the General Election (4th July): some thoughts from the Bishops of England and Wales about Life Issues. Despite advances in healthcare over the last few decades, increasing threats have developed to the life of the unborn and those who are suffering or close to the end of life. Each year there are over 200,000 abortions in the UK; it remains the case that both disability and sex are deemed as legitimate reasons for abortion. Some disabled children can be aborted up to birth. It is possible that, in the next parliament, there will be further moves to liberalise abortion up to birth for all babies. Debates are also ongoing regarding the legalisation of assisted suicide (often called assisted dying), which, in practice, could put the sick and vulnerable at risk. Our faith offers us a more hopeful and positive view of human life - that everyone has an intrinsic value from conception to natural death and beyond to eternal life. We are called to love, care for and cherish all life as a gift from God, especially the lives of the most vulnerable. It is important that we work together to promote a society where everyone can flourish. From the Parish Priest's Desk......

Dear Parishioners,

Ordinary time which started after the great feast of Pentecost, puts before us the teaching of Jesus. After living through the mysteries of his life, we now focus his teaching.

This weekend's gospel places before us Jesus' teaching on the Kingdom of God. We must imagine the joy in Jesus' heart as he teaches the people the truths and the beauty that he has come to establish on earth. Earlier in Mark (chp 1), Jesus tells us that the time is at hand, everything is ready and the kingdom of God is at hand. So we must change, repent and believe. The Catechism (541) tells us that Jesus that it was to fulfil the will of the Father that he inaugurated the kingdom

What is the purpose of the Kingdom? Again the Catechism tells us in the same section so that we be raised up to share his divine life. This is our vocation and the end to which everything leads to share the inner life of the trinity. All are called to enter.

A few points: (taken mainly from CCC sections 541 ff)

- To enter the kingdom we must accept the word of Jesus revealed in the gospels. This
 word has the power to transform us like the mustard seed but his word contains in
 itself, the very power to transform us.
- The call is addressed to the poor in spirit. In the sermon on the mount, Jesus tells us that blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. (Mt 5) This means we must become humble and like little children if we hope to enter the kingdom unless you be converted and become like little children, you cannot enter the kingdom of heaven. So many refused to enter because they were full of pride and would not accept Jesus' teaching. Others refuse the invitation because they have other priorities.
- This means (CCC 546) we must make a radical choice to gain the kingdom we must give up everything and prefer nothing or nobody to Jesus. There is a paradox here that only after we make this radical choice will be fully initiated into the secrets of the kingdom.

What is a good, quick and simple way to become another Christ and so be able to enter the kingdom on earth and upon our death its fullness in heaven? What it means is that we have to become an icon of Christ, another Christ so that Christ's life is lived fully in all its mysteries once again in and through us.

A simply prayer: We unite our minds and hearts to Jesus'; we unite our eyes with his eyes, our mouth with his mouth, our heartbeat with his heartbeat etc. We do this with a simply act of our will: "Jesus may we only think what you wish to think in us; Jesus may we see with your eyes so that we see people and things as you see them; Jesus may you direct our steps so that we are always walking only to follow you."

When we continue to pray this constantly Jesus is able to form us into tabernacles in which he can dwell. Then when we speak we are once again giving life to the words and thoughts of Jesus. He is able to use us to establish the kingdom firstly in us and then through us in the world. In the Our Father we are constantly praying that his kingdom come which implies it has yet to reach its fulness. Ezekiel in the first reading prophecies the fulness that the Kingdom will reach when every kind of bird will dwell there.

This spiritual journey to be completely identified with Christ, then produces in us as it did in St Paul (2^{nd} reading) the burning desire to be with Christ and to allow nothing in our lives to hinder this.

The other beautiful result of this radical choice to follow Christ, is that he makes it his concern to take care of everything – there is nothing too small, too unimportant that we cannot bring to him. Since we have given ourselves to him and his kingdom, he wishes to perfect us and let us experience the freedom and joy that he experienced in his life on earth.

Let us ask Mary to grant us this gift: never, ever again to allow anything or any moment in our lives to be separate from Christ; never to give life again to our own will in opposition to the will of the Father.
